Mayor Hutnick called the meeting to order at 7:05PM.

Mayor Hutnick led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Resolution 20-2019**

**WHEREAS**, the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse established the Municipal Alliances for the Prevention of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse in 1989 to educate and engage residents, local government and law enforcement officials, schools, nonprofit organizations, the faith community, parents, youth and other allies in efforts to prevent alcoholism and drug abuse in communities throughout New Jersey.

**WHEREAS**, The Borough Council of the Borough of Ogdensburg, County of Sussex, State of New Jersey recognizes that the abuse of alcohol and drugs is a serious problem in our society amongst persons of all ages; and therefore has an established Municipal Alliance Committee; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough Council further recognizes that it is incumbent upon not only public officials but upon the entire community to take action to prevent such abuses in our community; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Borough Council has applied for funding to the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse through the County of Sussex;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Borough of Ogdensburg, County of Sussex, State of New Jersey hereby recognizes the following:

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1. The Borough Council does hereby authorize submission of a strategic plan for the Ogdensburg Municipal Alliance grant for fiscal year 2020 in the amount of:

**Resolution 22-2019**

**WHEREAS**, the Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act, N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1 et seq. (the “Act”), authorizes local units of this State to enter into agreements with any other local unit or units to provide or receive any shared service that each local unit participating in the Agreement is empowered to provide or receive in its own jurisdiction; and

**WHEREAS**, N.J.S.A. 40A:9-140.10 requires each municipality to have a Chief Financial Officer, but same may be provided pursuant to a Shared Services Agreement hereinafter (“Agreement”) with another municipality; pursuant to N.J.S.A.40A:65-1 et seq.; and

**WHEREAS**, Sussex Borough and Ogdensburg are both in need of the services of a certified professional Chief Financial Officer to perform the duties of a Chief Financial Officer; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Ogdensburg and Borough of Sussex agreed to enter into a Shared Services Agreement for a Certified Financial Officer (CFO); and

**WHEREAS**, the parties have identified an area where working together through shared services will result in positive outcomes from both municipalities; and

**WHEREAS**, interviews were held on January 3, 2019 with representatives from both Municipalities present; and

**WHEREAS**, it was agreed by both parties on the best candidate for the CFO position was Michel Marceau, and

**WHEREAS**, Michel Marceau has accepted the offer of \$105,000 annually with health benefits for a four year term to begin on February 1, 2019; and

**WHEREAS**, salary, benefits and conditions are outlined in the attached Shared Services Agreement.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Ogdensburg approve the attached Shared Services Agreement appointing Michel Marceau as the Certified Financial Officer between the Borough of Ogdensburg and the Borough of Sussex with an annual salary beginning at \$105,000 with health benefits.

**ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE 02-2019**

Councilwoman O’Dell made a motion to adopt Ordinance 02-2019 “AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND SUPPLEMENT CHAPTER 3, POLICE REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF OGDENSBURG PROHIBITING “ENGINE-BRAKING” IN THE BOROUGH.” Seconded by Councilman Astor.

**Prior to final roll call Mayor Hutnick opened the meeting to the public for any comments regarding ordinance 02-2019.**

Eric Schmidl 16 Glenbrook Road commented some people may think this is a good idea, he does not. Mr. Schmidl explained why he didn’t think the ordinance was a good idea.

Councilman Opilla commented in any emergency situation they are allowed to do what they need to do. The town is not stopping them from using them in an emergency situation, the point of the ordinance is they are going through the town at an excessive speed limit; they are using their engine brakes as they see fit to try and stop. That is why there have been accidents on 517; the point of this is to deter them from driving through town at an excessive speed.

Mayor Hutnick commented by time they are hitting their brakes here, it didn’t happen here, it is already in place long before it got here because they do not glaze over instantly. Our police have stepped up their patrols and they are reporting back that yes these trucks are coming through at 8,

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9, 10 miles and hour if not more over the limit. Especially in the early hours of the morning [around] 2 or 3 o'clock. We are not talking about in an emergency situation; you stop the truck and do what you have to do.

Councilman Astor commented this is one aspect of our plan because we have had way too many accidents occurring, we are changing and adopting ordinances, we addressed it with the police, and we have addressed it with the local Quarry.

Mayor Hutnick commented the Quarry here even has a sign that says no Engine Brakes. Franklin is taking action now for when they can and cannot arrive to the quarry and blocking up Corkhill Road.

Councilman Nasisi commented we started to talk about the engine braking when someone on Richards Road had said it was the early morning hours, when they pull that engine brake then there is no one in front of them; they were preserving their brakes by using the engine brake.

Councilwoman O'Dell commented if these trucks travel through town at the rate of speed as our speed limit suggest there is no reason for an Engine Brake unless something pulls out in front of you or an animal. Councilwoman O'Dell commented she drove a bus for many years you can adjust your speed with your gears it is easy to do. These trucks come hauling through here, she lives on Main Street and she hears it all the time.

The discussion continued on the use of engine brakes, speeding problems 20 years ago, having a safety procedure, to keep our residents safe and emergency situations.

**INTRODUCTION TO ORDINANCE 03-2019**

Councilman Astor made a motion to introduce an ordinance 03-2019 entitled "AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF OGDENSBURG APPROVING A DRUG FREE ZONE MAP" Seconded by Councilman Opilla.

Councilman Astor commented he does see certain areas circled are those the only areas we are designating as a drug free zone.

Ms. Hough commented it is 1,000 feet from the school and 500 feet from parks, playgrounds, Heaters Pond and Municipal Park.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented it is to comply with the criminal justice code the State code.

Councilman Astor commented he wasn't sure about the soccer field that we utilize on Plant Street.

Ms. Hough commented DEP owns that. We get permission to use it.

Councilman Astor asked do we have to put that on our drug free zone map.

Councilman Nasisi commented who uses that field, ORA.

Mayor Hutnick commented it is still kids, we can add it, and it is still property in the town.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented we took it from the code and read part of the code.

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There was a discussion on the field and to add the field to the drug free zone map.

Mayor Hutnick commented lets table this one, we don't own it but we rent it and use it as a park.

Mr. Briigliodoro read the statue and explained the penalties of a drug substance in the drug free zone.

Mayor Hutnick asked if we add it and it is a mistake are we penalized for adding it on our map by mistake.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented no.

Councilman Astor made a motion to table his motion to introduce ordinance 03-2019. Seconded by Councilman Nasisi.

**OLD BUSINESS**

JCP & L/Firehouse parking lot light – Mayor Hutnick commented no new updates and we didn't have any complaints about the lighting.

Hot Water Heater – Councilman Nasisi commented we do have some news on the hot water heater and the boiler, we had to go with another contractor the first contractor something happened with their license; they were changing the company structure. The good new with the boiler for the Historical Building is instead of what we thought we were going to spend which was a little over eight thousand dollars the boiler actually checks out and it is in very good shape so we are going to do a gas conversion on it and still sleeve the chimney. It is going to be thousands less; a t least five thousand less.

Borough Hall Roof– Councilman Nasisi commented nothing new on the roof. We do have one quote but he is having a hard time getting someone else out [for another quote]. Councilman Nasisi commented he is going to give it one more round; he knows a lot of people in the business but he is reluctant to call anyone he knows.

Mayor Hutnick commented but at this point we have exercised all efforts and we are not getting any responses. Mayor Hutnick asked how many quotes to meet the bid requirements.

Councilman Nasisi commented you are supposed to have three and explained a conversation he had with Monica.

Councilman Nasisi commented we have also received some quotes on the electrical work to be done on the building here. The only thing he doesn't believe is on here is going to be the exit signs which we will find out if they get added, he believes they are hard wired. Councilman Nasisi explained the two proposals.

Mayor Hutnick commented he would like to add having cameras installed for the lobby.

Mayor Hutnick commented he had asked for a quote for new wiring but hasn't reviewed it yet.

Steam Boiler for Historical Building – See above under hot water heater.

Mr. Briigliodoro asked if we could go back to the drug free map. He looked further into the statue and read the definition of a public park. A public park is defined as being a recreation facility or recreation area or a playground owned or controlled by a State, County or Local Government Unit.”

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There was a discussion on the definition.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented it is land owned by the State, it is a recreation area, and he would include it.

Block 30 Lot11.05 Wausau Street Septic Repair – Councilman Nasisi commented he is going to put something in the budget naturally and we are going to wait until the spring but that is for the septic abandonment for the Wausau Street Septic the old one that is still there. He believes they are doing some work to the lot there are several trees down.

Councilwoman Slater commented DPW has been going up and taking the trees down; they were doing that in September/October.

Councilman Nasisi asked what was the situation with the tree on the neighbor's garage. It's been there for a while.

Councilwoman Slater commented it should go through her insurance it is on her building.

Councilman Nasisi asked if anyone has reached out to her.

Ms. Hough commented she sent her a tort claim.

Councilwoman Slater commented this was last year.

Councilman Nasisi commented because when he goes in there he has to make it safe, he can grab it.

Councilwoman Slater commented if you do damage to the garage then we are in trouble, she has to have her insurance look at it before we can touch it.

Councilman Nasisi commented but in the meantime that is another hazard because if someone or if a kid walks on that property, it is town property, and the tree falls we have a bigger problem.

There was a discussion back and forth regarding the septic and this property.

Discussion of CFO – Mayor Hutnick commented he is happy to report we have a new CFO. The offer was accepted so between ourselves and Sussex we have a new CFO who will be starting this Friday, February 1. He came to our Budget meeting on his own and has been working with Monica to get caught up on what is going on. We are moving forward and making progress. Monica will stay with us through the budget proceedings and happily turn over the reins to our new CFO. He thinks between the hiring of him and Kim's promotion that area is going to be strong.

Email Technology – Councilman Nardini commented you can take this off for now, we have created our emails and Robin is going to go around and get all the departments set up. We can hold off until we decided if there will be a change in the internet. In the spring newsletter we could add the new email addresses. We have fire and OEM too.

Crosswalk – Councilman Astor commented we have a meeting on [January] 30<sup>th</sup> to discuss the crosswalk. He will have more information at the next meeting.

Professional Services Attorney and Engineer – Mayor Hutnick commented we are going to stay with Van Cleef and he is still waiting to have a legal discussion. Once he has this discussion he will decide after that.

Councilman Astor commented we can take the engineer off. Mayor Hutnick agreed.

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Blue Diamond- Councilman Astor commented he has reached out a couple of times to talk to Bob Dorber at Blue Diamond with no response, the Mayor was just telling him that other towns are going through this similar situation where they basically breached the contract requesting more funds and then not calling back when the other towns have reached out to them.

Mayor Hutnick commented the bills we have received for Blue Diamond, we are not paying them put them aside; we pay them their contracting rate only and not the additional charges they want to impose upon us. Mayor Hutnick commented he spoke with a neighboring town Mayor today they are having the exact same problem as are some others, we are going to sit down and chat and maybe collectively as a group [and discuss] how we can handle this and deal with what is going on. Garbage bids are coming up all over the place. Other towns are in the same boat.

There was a discussion on garbage pickup, Blue Diamond and other garbage companies in the area.

Block 21 Lot 27, 76 Kennedy Ave.- Mayor Hutnick commented he brought this up at the last meeting we have interested parties in the block of land on Kennedy Ave. Mayor Hutnick commented he attended the Land Use Meeting last week and he presented this to them; Land Use was in support of this property possibly being sold they also have a large list of properties all over town that they would like to discuss development of. Whether it is commercial or residential and most happen to be commercial; they are large enough to put in a substantial building or two. Something that can generate taxes coming in; bring companies into town. Land Use is on board with discussing growth and redevelopment of Ogdensburg.

Radon Awareness – Councilman Nardini commented he gave Robin the information and had some emails with Donna going back and forth with what the County does. Donna reached out to the County to see what the process was. She was saying the kits are expensive \$50.00 or \$60.00 we won't get that many and we would reach that \$1,000 maximum quickly. Councilman Nardini asked her to follow up and see if we could get this in and then figure out what we can do to get it out there.

Hydrant Flushing – Mayor Hutnick commented you can table this for now, take it off for another couple weeks.

Councilwoman Slater commented we are going to set up a meeting with Chris and the Fire Department.

Mayor Hutnick commented that is why we will put it aside for now to have more discussion with everybody.

Councilwoman Slater asked do we need the Fire Department there since two of the DPW are members are on the Fire Department, so technically you have Fire Department representation.

Councilman Astor commented are we paying the DPW or are they there as the Fire Department.

Councilwoman Slater commented she is just saying they are the ones and they are there.

Councilman Astor asked Mr. Briigliodoro legally speaking we have two individuals on DPW that are also part of the Fire Department they will do the Hydrants; where does the responsibilities fall should something happens.

Councilwoman Slater commented they are all under our insurance anyway so it shouldn't matter.

Mr. Briigliodoro asked what time of the day are they doing this.

Councilman Astor commented during work hours.

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There was a discussion on this issue of two DPW workers also being Firemen.

**NEW BUSINESS**

First Aid Squad – Councilwoman O’Dell commented to touch on what we brought up at the last meeting with the Squad needing so many things to move along with their building. Such as the kitchen, septic, driveway that didn’t get done this year; there are some many things that need to be done so they can upgrade.

Councilwoman O’Dell commented Habit for Humanity is taking over the 5K; they are looking for groups in town to hand out water or T-Shirts or garbage bags etc as they are running by throughout the run. The date is June 15, he is going to get the paper work in and talk to the Chief to get working on this.

Mayor Hutnick asked if they had a route.

Councilwoman O’Dell commented she believes it is the same route they did two years ago. The PTO is on board for one spot.

Councilman Astor commented to let them know [to ask] the National Junior Honor Society and Student Council [to help]. Councilman Astor commented the High School as well.

There was a discussion on the 5K.

Councilwoman O’Dell commented she talked to Alan [from the First Aid Squad] regarding getting new members and to get an idea of what is needed. The State pays for the courses. Councilwoman O’Dell explained the courses are not local anymore and it is difficult to take them; volunteers just can’t get it done.

Municipal Alliance Equipment – Councilwoman O’Dell commented we are getting some meetings together, Monica is going to let us all know, probably on Wednesday. As far as our equipment we can’t keep it in the Squad building, they said there is a metal shed out back, with a mud floor, you can put pallets in it but that will not help the electrical equipment like TV and stuff like that.

There was a discussion on where Municipal Alliance Equipment could be stored.

Master Plan Reexamination Report and Resolution – Mayor Hutnick commented no discussion.

**PUBLIC SESSION**

Councilwoman Slater moved, Councilman Opilla seconded motion to open the public session of the meeting. All were in favor.

Mike Blahut, Kennedy Ave, asked for some clarification for town owned property and how they dispose of it; for instance selling the property to someone, what the whole legal process is supposed to be.

Mayor Hutnick commented the property would be looked at and assessed with the Land Use Board, if the Land Use Board and the Council decided yes we want to sell that property then it goes out to fair market bid, it gets appraised, we get a number and then it become public.

Mr. Blahut asked when it becomes a fair market bid is that in the newspaper.

Mr. Brigliadoro commented it would be published.

Councilwoman Slater commented however she believes if there is an adjoining property to it that person can buy it.

Councilman Nasisi commented yes, it doesn’t have to go out to bid if it’s adjoining.

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Mr. Briigliodoro commented if it is a piece of property that doesn't met zoning standards that is one thing, if you have a little sliver of land that doesn't comply with the zoning ordinance for a buildable lot that is one issue. If you have a buildable lot that conforms to zoning under circumstances like that, that really has to go out to public bid as opposed to the adjoining property.

Mayor Hutnick commented this is a considerable size lot.

Councilman Nasisi commented we had gotten that answer for the other two lots on Main Street if you recall last year, which are buildable and we questioned that. The answer we got back was that it doesn't have to go out to bid if it is going to be purchased by someone who is an adjacent property owner, does that still remain.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented if you have a buildable lot and let's say a property owner wants to buy it you just can't offer it to them.

Councilman Nasisi commented the answer we got was

Councilwoman Slater continued we could. We were told he owns the property around the corner we emailed to see if we had to go out to bid. Councilwoman Slater commented she believes your email said if it was an adjacent owner he can purchase it because it was an adjoining property.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented he will check on that.

Councilman Nasisi commented he thought you did then.

Councilwoman Slater commented he was going to come to a meeting to talk to us about it that was why we looked into it before he came up here.

Mr. Blahut asked how do you find out if it is a buildable lot.

Mr. Briigliodoro commented you have to look at the lot area with zoning.

Mr. Blahut asked who does that.

Councilman Nasisi commented Land Use.

There was a discussion on properties in town.

Eric Schmidl 16 Glenbrook commented when Elizabethtown Gas was putting the lines in that goes to the top of Glenbrook they have this large green chest with bollards around it. He spoke to their representative twice that needs some type of shield around it to protect it from the snow plows and explained. Mr. Schmidl explained some possible options for the storage of equipment.

There was a discussion on the equipment storage.

There being no further business from the public, Councilman Nasisi moved, Councilwoman Slater seconded motion to close the public session of the meeting. All were in favor.
